- 00:32 Before, working in Chicago in machine gun shop with brother-in-law
- 00:56 Decided to join Navy with wife's cousin, June 1, 1942
- 01:15 Basic Training, Great Lakes, IL boot camp
- 01:26 Sent to Iowa State electrical school, 4 months
- 02:10 Gyrocompass school in San Francisco, CA
- 02:25 Training, needed men to man LSTs (Landing Ship, Tank)
- 02:56 Vancouver, WA, about LST 45, plank owner, March 17, 1943 September 1945
- 03:50 Training as crew, Columbia River, storm in Pacific, more guns installed in San Francisco
- 04:36 Guns installed on ship, 720's, 3-inch gun, 50 calibers, anti-aircraft, armament, well armed
- 05:17 Kamikazes
- 05:26 Leaving from San Francisco, CA to Pearl Harbor, no escort
- 06:04 Pearl Harbor, one week, loaded cargo
- 06:38 Voyage to Samoa, New Hebrides
- 06:50 Landings, had not practiced landing or beaching before first mission
- 07:03 Military needed them to get there as quickly as possible

- 07:14 Stern anchor, complications when dropped too quickly
- 07:24 Losing and retrieving Stern Anchor
- 09:13 From New Hebrides to Brisbane, Australia, cargo of cola and beer, to New Guinea, 1943
- 09:50 LCT main deck
- 10:00 12 degree list on ship to starboard, slid LCT off into water
- 10:20 Landings
- 10:32 First invasion at New Guinea
- 10:45 On beach during mission at New Guinea: tanks, trucks, army equipment, 6 other ships, LCIs unloading on beach
- 12:05 Attacked by Japanese planes in afternoon before landing, other boats, Japanese protecting islands
- 13:30 Destroyers
- 13:34 Not a big invasion
- 14:00 Invasion, trips to beach; Milne Bay up to Lee, New Guinea, 300-400 mile run
- 14:41 473 got hit, taken to Australia for repairs
- 14:57 More invasions in New Guinea, New Breton islands, got stuck on beach under fire, tug boat rescue attempt, had to wait for tide
- 16:32 Mines in water
- 17:00 Got report that Japanese had broken through lines, 45s issued to crew, never boarded ship
- 17:47 Captain wrote story, The Night that would Never End
- 18:08 Recovering after invasions, invasions in New Guinea, at least 8 landings
- 18:30 New Guinea early on, Japanese about to go to Australia from Port Moresby
- 19:14 Supposed to land at Hollandia, New Guinea, 70% casualties expected, went in and all of the Japanese soldiers were not there anymore
- 20:38 Leave in Australia in February, 1944
- 21:15 New Breton, stuck on beach
- 21:40 Up the coast of New Guinea

- 22:03 Travel to Philippines, October 20, 1944, 20<sup>th</sup> birthday
- 22:30 Other invasions: there was a Central Pacific unit making landings
- 22:58 His theatre, MacArthur was "kingpin"
- 23:08 Casualties at Tarawa, over 1,000 marines killed, failed to get to shore, had to wade
- 24:00 Philippines, Tokyo Rose said Leyte gulf was graveyard for LSTs
- 24:29 Hit a sandbar half a mile away from beach, plane flew down between ships and ships accidentally shot each other, lots of ammunition wasted
- 26:05 Sites on beach, pillbox had sustained direct hit
- 26:52 Resupply, Japanese started using Kamikaze planes, two hospital ships got hit
- 27:12 Shooting kamikaze planes, LSTs, LSTs targets for kamikaze planes, kamikaze pilots
- 28:34 Lingayen Gulf invasion, convoy over 30 miles long
- 29:13 Japanese swimming under boxes to attach explosives to undersides of ships
- 29:44 Forces put out a lot of information to keep servicemen on the ball
- 29:55 Destroyer Cole in Yemen damaged by enemy explosives
- 30:31 Shoot first to be safe
- 30:46 Lingayen Gulf invasion, 30 mile convoy, troops later went South to Manila; under fire, duties on ship, travel from Leyte to Lingayen Gulf, LSTs, cargo ships, LCVPs
- 34:17 Risk of submarine attacks, watching guard, rumors
- 35:50 Illinois LST Association
- 36:10 Back-to-back missions
- 36:25 Leave in Australia 10 days
- 38:07 Animosity towards American soldiers
- 38:53 Back from Leave, Milne Bay, 1944, landings in New Guinea
- 39:35 Lingayen Gulf
- 39:50 Manila, 1st LST in Manila Bay, over 300 sunken ships
- 40:39 Manila: pictures, bombed, mostly by Americans

- 41:15 Poor treatment of Philippines by Japanese
- 41:30 Ship duties in Manila
- 42:08 April, 1945, war winding down
- 42:48 Plans for invasion of Japanese mainland
- 43:07 Back to New Guinea, loading for Navy
- 43:12 Bomb dropped on Hiroshima
- 43:20 Leyte Gulf, anchored in bay
- 43:45 Out early, signed up for Minority Cruise at 17, got back just before turned 21
- 44:20 Back to States on Danish transport ship, 20 days going 20 knots, landed in Seattle
- 45:08 Sent to Saint Louis, MO
- 45:19 No travel pay, joined in Saint Louis, discharged in Saint Louis
- 45:33 Home in Michigan, brother-in-law in Chicago
- 45:53 Back to work for old superintendant, quit
- 46:15 Experiences returning, Chicago, liberties of civilian life
- 47:40 Civilian life, going out
- 47:50 Formative part of life
- 48:09 Benefits from being in Navy, electrical trade
- 48:20 Wrap-up
