I believe that public media is one of the best examples we have of a successful public-private partnership. For a small annual investment from the federal government (about \$1.60 per person), stations like ours provide programming, news, and educational content, and partner with other community organizations to highlight the uniqueness of our region. This extends far beyond our NPR, PBS, and classical music.

For example, throughout Illinois Public Media's history, agricultural reporting has been an integral part of our programming, reflecting an important Illinois industry and helping to fulfill our mission at a land grant university. Our flagship ag program, the **Closing Market Report**, is celebrating 40 years of providing essential information every day to Illinois farmers. This programming is only possible through our strong partnership with University of Illinois Extension. Learn about this month's All Day Ag Outlook on page 18.

Another great example of a successful partnership is our Book Mentor Program, which is celebrating its 20th anniversary this year. With the help of a generous grant from PNC Grow Up Great foundation, we partner with area Head Start locations to provide books, learning activities, and volunteer connections to thousands of area children as part of our educational outreach mission. Learn more on page 19.

These are just two examples among many, many more that I could share. As the national debate over federal funding for public media heats up, it's important to remember that local public media stations like IPM provide a myriad of services that are unique to our local communities. And we can continue to do all of this thanks to your gifts combined with critical federal, state, and University of Illinois financial support.

women's history month Meet the women of World War II

American women were the secret weapon that won World War II and changed the world in the process. Hear directly from the women who built the planes and flew them, fought on the warfront and the homefront, and who broke codes and barriers. **Women of World War II: The Untold Stories** brings history to life with newly rediscovered interviews and archival materials — from the Women's Airforce Service Pilots who risked their lives flying planes for target practice to one of the most courageous American spies and the African American Central Postal battalion that secured victory over the Axis. The new documentary airs at 5:30 pm Sunday, March 2 and 10 pm Tuesday, March 4.

Met premiere of 'Grounded' featured



Great Performances at the Met debuts a powerful new opera by two-time Tony Award-winning composer Jeanine Tesori. Commissioned by the Met Opera and based on librettist George Brant's acclaimed play, **Grounded** premiered last fall. Mezzosoprano Emily D'Angelo headlines in the tour-de-force role of a fighter pilot whose unplanned pregnancy takes her out of the cockpit to operate a Reaper drone halfway around the world. Music Director Yannick Nézet-Séguin takes the podium. High-tech staging provides a variety of perspectives on the action. **Grounded** premieres at 8 pm Friday, March 21.

The journey of a female basketball prodigy



Independent Lens presents *Home Court*, the coming-ofage story of Ashley Chea, a Cambodian American basketball prodigy in southern California whose life intensifies as recruitment heats up. Filmed over three years, the film follows the Chea family dynamics, both tender and tragic, as Ashley navigates being one of the top basketball recruits in the country while overcoming injury as well as racial and class differences. *Home Court* airs on **Independent Lens** at 9 pm Monday, March 24. This program will be available to stream for 90 days on the PBS app beginning the same day.

A musical and political journey

Singing for Justice tells the story of Faith Petric (1915-2013), a San Francisco-based political radical, musical organizer, and joyous performer who united folk music and activism through almost a century of American social movements. Told largely by Petric herself, the film weaves her musical and political journeys to showcase the central role of folk music in the transformational social movements of the 20th century. **Singing for Justice** airs at 9:30 pm Friday, March 28.



'Marie Antoinette' returns with season 2



When **Marie Antoinette** returns for season 2, bigger and stronger enemies are waiting to destroy her. At the height of their power, Marie Antoinette and King Louis XVI face an unprecedented crisis. The incessant attacks of Provence and Chartres against the royal couple stir up the hatred of the nobles while disastrous consequences loom with the Diamond Necklace Affair. From Versailles to the Palais-Royal, the revolt rumbles on. Season 2 airs at 9 pm Sundays, beginning March 23. Or binge all eight episodes with WILL Passport on the night of its broadcast premiere. Season 1 is streaming now.

Our favorite midwives are back

Season 14 of **Call the Midwife** premieres at 7 pm Sunday, March 30. It is 1970 in Poplar. Activists on the Isle of Dogs block access in their bid for independence, so Dr. Turner and the midwives must work to keep things running as usual. Meanwhile, Nonnatus House will continue to tackle social challenges such as poor housing, poverty, and various health issues, including a puzzling case of apparent immaculate conception. Each episode will premiere on WILL Passport 30 days prior to its broadcast date (released weekly). Episode 1 will be available in Passport on Feb. 28.



Final season of 'Wolf Hall' begins March 23



Eagerly awaited and years in the making, **Wolf Hall: The Mirror and the Light on MASTERPIECE** premieres at 8 pm Sunday, March 23. Based on the final novel in Hilary Mantel's award-winning trilogy, it traces the final years of Thomas Cromwell's (Mark Rylance) life and journey to become the most influential figure of his time under the notorious King Henry VIII (Damian Lewis). The series picks up in May 1536. Anne Boleyn, Henry's second wife, is dead, and he is with his third queen. Cromwell emerges to continue his climb to power and wealth, caught between his desire to do what is right and

his instinct to survive. Binge all six episodes of this series with WILL Passport starting on March 23, the night of its broadcast premiere. The first season of **Wolf Hall** is streaming now with Passport.

More murder and mayhem in Midsomer

Season 22 of **Midsomer Murders** premieres on WILL-TV at 8 pm Saturday, March 22. Based on the crime-novel series by author Caroline Graham, the series follows the efforts of Detective Chief Inspector John Barnaby to solve crimes that occur in a wealthy, isolated English county. His right-hand man is Detective Sergeant Jamie Winter, who is young, keen, and smart as a whip. Season 22 follows Barnaby (Neil Dudgeon) and Winter (Nick Hendrix) as they investigate an urban myth becoming a murderous reality, a post-operative heart rehabilitation



club whose members' dreams of a second chance at life are cut short, a murder mystery weekend, a twisted scarecrow festival, an amateur dramatics company with deadly secrets, and a body found with ritualistic symbols. Each of the six two-part episodes are broadcast together.



Annual Ag Outlook returns March 4

Join us for the annual All Day Ag Outlook on Tuesday, March 4, at the Beef House in Covington, Indiana. Farmers attend the annual meeting to garner information for the upcoming growing season.

The meeting is hosted by Illinois Public Media, the farmdoc team from the University of Illinois Department of Agricultural and Consumer Economics, WILLAg.org, and University of Illinois Extension. IPM has hosted the event since 1991.

"The event always anchors farm-related decisions from what crops to plant and when to go to market to how world events are influencing commodity exports," said organizer and host Todd Gleason, ag information producer at IPM News and a farm broadcaster for Illinois Extension.

This year's lineup includes presentations on the South American and U.S. growing seasons, autonomous operations on the farm, budgets and outlook, crop insurance, the price of farmland, and two panel discussions — one on soybeans and one on corn.

This is the 35th annual All Day Ag Outlook and will include a toast to the creation of IPM's **Closing Market Report**, which debuted in January 1985. Over the last 40 years, there have been more than 10,000 episodes of the daily radio program that also has been a podcast since 2003.

In addition, the All Day Ag Outlook will host a book signing by Neil Dahlstrom, author of "Tractor Wars." See page 11 for more on the Iowa PBS documentary of the same name airing on WILL-TV this month. In addition, farmdoc team members Scott Irwin ("Back to the Futures") and Jonathan Coppess ("The Fault Lines of Farm Policy" and "Between Soil and Society") will sign copies of their books. Bring a copy of the books with you to be signed. You may purchase the books at go.illinois.edu/farmdocBooks.

Outreach program celebrates 20 years



Research consistently shows that reading to young children regularly has a significant positive impact on their language development, vocabulary acquisition, comprehension skills, and overall readiness for school. Illinois Public Media's Book Mentor Project is deeply invested in early childhood education. Thanks to a very generous ongoing grant from PNC Grow Up Great, we have been strengthening relationships

between pre-kindergarten children and reading since 2004. We accomplish this by providing carefully selected books and activities designed to deepen learning in the classroom as well as at home, and members of our local community become invested in the outcomes of children throughout east central Illinois.

"As a book mentor volunteer myself, I see firsthand the importance and impacts of a program like this each month," said Moss Bresnahan, executive director of Illinois Public Media. "Helping students of all ages learn is a core mission of every PBS member station and has been since the earliest days of **Sesame Street** more than 50 years ago. For 20 of those years, our Book Mentor Project has been no exception, and we couldn't do it without our funding partner PNC Grow Up Great."

Ahead of each school year, Illinois Public Media recruits and trains local volunteers to become book mentors. Each month mentors visit the same Head Start classroom — from Urbana to Champaign to Rantoul — to read

that month's book selection and join the children in a book-related, hands-on activity to reinforce a math, science, language, or arts skill. The project provides teachers with lesson plans and the classroom materials to support this curriculum.

"The Book Mentor Project encourages parents and family members to sit down and read to their child, especially when the child comes home so excited about the book and activity that was provided for them that day," said Jacki Buckingham, a family child care mentor for the Early Childhood Education Program at Head Start.

Additionally, the project provides families with copies of the books, resources to facilitate at-home learning, and events to bring that excitement out of the classroom and into everyday life through four family nights per school year.

Daiane Geremias Goulart serves as the Book Mentor Project coordinator through a graduate assistantship, creating the monthly curriculum guides for volunteers, teachers, and families to use as well as leading each of the family night events. Goulart is getting her Master of Arts in Latin American and Caribbean studies at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, with an interest in applying her studies to educational initiatives.

Amelia Bellizzi, a junior in the Gies College of Business at Illinois, is this year's Book Mentor Project assistant, handling the day-to-day clerical and administrative support tasks on top of managing the inventory and deliverables for the project. "Working on the book mentor project has been an amazing experience to be part of and I have enjoyed interacting with the community and giving back. I have had a great time getting to know others working on the project and enjoy the work that I do organizing and distributing the books and activities for the program," Bellizzi said.

Michelle Garduno, a sophomore studying Human Development and Family Studies at Illinois, serves as the program's Spanish translator.

The Book Mentor Project serves more than 350 children across 12 Head Start classrooms and eight off-site locations throughout east central Illinois, giving out 2,450 books to children and families annually. In addition, Kiwanis Club of Champaign-Urbana coordinates a Book Mentor Jr. program with IPM that provides additional volunteer activities for Head Start's younger classrooms.

Time to get back in the garden

As we approach the official start of spring, we caught up with Tinisha Spain, host of **Mid American Gardener**, about plans for her garden and the show.

Q. What are you eyeing in the seed catalogs for your own garden this year?

A. This year I've decided to grow things I've never grown before, so we will try a variety of new fruits and vegetables. We will grow brussels sprouts, eggplant, maybe artichokes, the world's smallest tomato, garlic, and lots of herbs and berries.

Q. For anyone starting seeds, which past episode(s) would you suggest they check out?

A. Yes! Longtime panelist Marti Alagna and I did a full segment on seed starting on the Jan. 30 episode (of this year). You can learn the whole process there. She walks you through everything from planting depth, to keeping your trays clean, and when to water.

O. How will you challenge yourself in the garden this year? A. My goal this year is to stay on top of the weeds and not let them get out of hand in the dog days of summer when I don't exactly feel like pulling weeds.

My other challenge this year will be to tend to, but not harvest the asparagus. I planted it last year, and you are not supposed to harvest any until the second year, so this spring I will have to walk past that deliciousness until 2026.

Q. Do you have any suggestions for people that want to introduce more native plants and pollinators into their landscape?

A. Reach out to your local extension office. Many of them have seeds on hand that you can have free of charge to start in your own landscape. In Vermilion County, the Danville Public Library offers free seeds on behalf of the Vermilion County Master Gardeners. Another way is to keep an eye out this spring for local plant sales. Find FFA chapters or horticulture classes that offer natives. You'll get a great plant and support local gardeners — a win-win.

Q. What can we expect from Mid American Gardener in 2025?

A. We are excited to bring you more great gardening information from our experts. We want **Mid American Gardener** to inspire people to tear into that first pack of seeds or buy that first tomato plant and put them in the ground. My goal as your host is to make gardening accessible, inclusive, and fun! Viewers can also expect us to be out and about all across central Illinois learning new things, trying new things, and bringing them the best in zone 6 gardening.
